his year, UCas celebrated a record rise in students accepting university places and even better, many of these students progressed to university from a rigorous, high standard, vocational qualification.

What's more, recent research — carried out by the Institute for Public Policy Research — highlighted that many of the key jobs expected to drive economic growth in the future will be accessible with a vocational qualification.

Also I took the picture on my phone. I thought that this would be a good staged scene to create as it is the sort of thing that students do when they get home from a long day at college or uni.


I saw this competition online from last year. I loved looking at some of the winner and runner-up pictures. This inspired me to enter and use their photos as inspiration to create my own.

HARRY COLLINS, 16


BTec level three photography Fareham College, Hampshire

I did this by creating a joiner image that shows the same girl progressing through education as the crosses the road.




MICHAEL FLEMING, 17 Level two media


UAL level three extended diploma art and design – photography

chose to take this image as sometimes students feel 'buried in work' with no escape. I felt the black and white edit was appropriate as sometimes college work can be a bit dull.

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
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RAY-ANNA COLLINS, 17


creates the impression of playfulness and relaxed mood as college is not all about stress and deadlines.
